District adopts Haiti home grown relief project

7750 July 2010

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DG Becky Faulkner's primary international focus this year is possibly one of the most ambitious international efforts District 7750 has ever embarked on.

She is encouraging all Rotary clubs in the District to consider playing some part in raising \$500,000 for the Haiti Home Grown Relief Project sponsored by Partners in Agriculture, a subsidiary of Partners in Health, a major NGO that has operated in Haiti for over twenty years.

Partners in Agriculture is led by Charles and Gillaine Warne. Charles is the president of Greenville Rotary Club.

Given the tragedy that has resulted from the devastating earthquake there, Partners in Agriculture has increased the acreage they control from 150 to 500 acres. They hope to use their Family Assistance Pro-

gram to make 1,000 more Haitian farmers self-sufficient within the next year.

The plan is to train the farmers in sustainable agricultural methods, give them a goat and some chicken, seed, fertilizer, and technical support so they can grow crops not only for their families, but also sell some of their produce to their neighbors.

After one year, each family will be required to give another family a female goat, chickens, and some of their seed. In that way, the program will continue to expand with the help of Partners in Agriculture.

The program will include completion of a vocational school on the farm that will perfect the agricul-



tural training and provide training in other relevant skills such as forestry, bee keeping, sanitation, charcoal production, and watershed management.

The school will become the site of cottage industries and will be available for retreats, summer camps, seminars and sporting events.

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DG Becky Faulkner Makes First Club Visit

Becky Faulkner began her year as District Governor with a visit to the Lancaster Rotary Club. President Herb Welch welcomed her enthusiastically and said that he and the club leadership intended to make at least the Bronze Governor's Club of Excellence level.

The Lancaster Club is one of the largest clubs outside of the major urban areas of the District and participated in 10 local service projects and two international projects last year. DG Becky emphasized to the

club that her main message this year will follow RI President Ray Klingensmith's call to make our clubs "Bigger, Better, and Bolder!"

DG Becky noted that this year's theme "Building Communities, Bridging Continents" emphasizes both the dedicated local community service that Rotary is noted for as well as Rotary's leading role in making the world a healthier, safer, more peaceful place for all to live.

She shared with the club that there

have been no new polio cases in both India and Pakistan for the last six months. With polio still a dangerous threat in only India, Pakistan, Nigeria, and Afghanistan, DG Becky projected that we may eliminate polio from the face of the earth by 2012.

She encouraged the Lancaster Rotarians to join the District in the final push to match the Gates Foundation's \$200,000,000 challenge during her year as DG.

Rich receives Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service Award

Congratulations to Rich Waugh, who received the Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award. There are only 200 of these awards given annually. The award was in honor of Rich's efforts as District Foundation Chair and Regional Chair for four other Districts. District 7750 had an increase of 15% last year, the highest increase in contributions in Zones 33 and 34. Zone 33 was also the only zone in the world that had 100% of its clubs contribute to the Foundation.





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Literacy continues as a major focus for District

DG Becky Faulkner is encouraging all Rotary clubs in the District to find ways of supporting the District's goal to reduce illiteracy both in South Carolina and throughout the world, particularly in developing countries like Haiti.

She is sharing the locally based Ready4Reading initiative being pursued by a number of clubs. Ready4Reading is a non-profit organization led by Sara Mansbach, a fellow Rotarian and the District Literacy Coordinator.

The program encourages Rotary clubs to adopt Head Start Centers, Health Waiting Rooms, and Social Service Center Lobbies and provide books and readers to the underprivileged kids who are using these facilities. Books are the best source of new words. Children who interact with books have larger vocabularies and learn to read better.

The following statistics tell the shocking story about too many economically deprived youngsters today:

- Only 36% of economically challenged parents read daily to their preschoolers
- 60% of economically challenged families have no books in their homes.

While in middle income neighborhoods the ratio of books per child is 13 to 1, in low-income neighborhoods, the ratio is 1 age-appropriate book for every 300 children.

Get involved with a preschool literacy program with great impact for your club —In District 7750 or Haiti

Goal: Provide preschool children with an early language foundation leading to high school graduation and a literate workforce.

Why? In South Carolina, 48 % minority children aren't ready to read and 40 percent can't communicate well for first grade. In Haiti, 52% of the adults are illiterate.

Raising A Reader® is already proven in first grade readiness in English and Hispanic families. It works through a circulating book bag program supported by 4 Family Fun evenings. Serves children 2 to 5 years old. Club members get involved in the 4 Family Fun evenings.



Cost: Approximately \$3000 per one classroom which when established serves 140 children up to 7 years. Ongoing yearly sustaining expenses run about \$800 per year. Sites: Preschools, adult education centers, family child-care homes, churches—any place where parents and children routinely gather. (www.raisingareader.org) Call 864-250-8868.

Haitian Preschool Picture Book Project

In our visit to Haiti, your District 7750 team went to six preschools with 250 3 and 4 year old children, We brought a few books to each school. None of the children had ever seen a picture book. Working through the Cange village library, we hope to bring children's books in French to schools. The small Cange library, used recently as a medical supply depot for earthquake victims, must also be restored. Call: 864-250-8868.

Cost: We are looking for a club(s) to spearhead this project and apply for a District Simplified Grant. The total budget is approximately \$7500. Volunteer time is needed. 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The 2009-10 results are in — almost

As we prepare the July District Newsletter, the Rotary Foundation is still accepting contributions for the 2009-10 Rotary year. There are contributions from our District to be counted so the results reported here are preliminary.

Total contributions from our District Rotarians are down 11% but that does not tell the real story. While Annual Programs Fund (APF) giving is down 31% (\$252,360), contributions to Restricted Giving for the \$200 Million Challenge (Polio Eradication) is up 49% (\$83,532). And \$1100 has been contributed to the Permanent Fund this year versus zero last year. We are 7% short on our District's APF goal but with additional contributions to be recorded, we should be very close.

Within the District, 21 of 54 clubs met or exceeded their APF goal. All clubs made a contribution to the APF for the fourth year in a row. Congratulations!

The top three per capita giving clubs are Greater Greer, Aiken-Sunrise and Clover. Way to go! Overall, APF per capita giving within the District declined from \$160/Rotarian in 2008-09 to \$88/Rotarian this year. We can do better.

Greg Mortenson (Three Cups of Tea) talked about building schools for educating women in Pakistan and Afghanistan. The Taliban have bombed or burned 2000 schools, but today there are 9 million children in schools, compared to 800,000 in 2000. 2.3 million are girls. Mortenson and the Central Asia Institute have now built 178 schools, which are a "candle of hope" for this war torn region.

Bruce Aylward (International polio coordinator for the World Health Organization. He started his talk with "I don't have good news...I have great news." Polio has become WHO's #1 priority. There is a new vaccine and new resources from Rotary, the Gates Foundation and others. Here are the incredible results. Nigeria: 99% reduction. India (provinces of Bahar and Uddar Predesh): NO NEW CASES IN SIX MONTHS. For the first time, I heard officials of the World Health Organization say that polio will be eradicated in the near future. The overall number of cases are about the same because of an unfortunate, but very solvable outbreak in the European country of Tyrgyztan, north of Afghanistan. It is the reason that we need to **END POLIO NOW**. The important thing is that WHO is winning in the difficult areas of the world.

Governor of Ontario and an international advocate for people with disabilities, Queen Noor of Jordan(an American who married King Hussein), a Peace Scholar from Cypress forging connections between Greek Cypress and Turkish Cypress.

World class entertainment included Celtic Thunder, Cirque du Soleil and British Opera Singer Russell Watson.
